APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

Motion made by Harvala and seconded by Keller to approve the 06/24/2025 Park/Planning Commission/Economic Development Commission Meeting minutes: Aye 2/0, Abstain Cordell, absent

CONSIDER ZONING LAND USE AMENDMENTS RELEVANT TO CANNABIS

- a) Land Use Table
- b) Zoning Map
- c) Draft Ordinance amending City Code Title IX by adopting a new Chapter 114 relating to cannabis retail businesses; and amending Chapter 95 relating to grounds for suspension of a tobacco license
- d) Draft Ordinance amending Chapter 157 relating to cannabis
- e) Draft resolution amending 2025 Fee Schedule related to cannabis retail registrations.

Planning Commission acknowledged review of the above listed documents.

Commission informed that 5 businesses in town have licenses to sell the low potency edibles – Kwik Trip, Holiday, St. Boni Liquor, St. Boni Bistro and Crossbar. Council has chosen to be the registrant for the cannabis licenses which will include the low potency edibles listed and the regular cannabis licenses. This provides the council with the ability to change the setback requirements for locations of the retail businesses.

Chris Dana and Kailan Johnson were present to discuss zoning requirements for cannabis businesses located in St. Bonifacius.

Dana introduced himself stating he is renovating the property located at 4110 Main Street to open a new business in the emerging cannabis industry. He is making the following requests regarding the proposed regulations:

1. Proposing exception to proposed setbacks requirements for cannabis retail location on Main Street specifically for property located at 4110 Main Street.
2. Allow 2 retail cannabis be issued for City of St. Bonifacius.
3. Licenses to be awarded through a fair lottery system rather than first come first serve basis especially for the initial licensing period.

He went on to back up the requests stating that liquor stores have sold adult products on Main Street for years. A cannabis retail store would also have state regulations that need to be followed along with security measures for selling to adults only. Two retail cannabis licenses will provide healthy competition and offer a choice to consumers and double the potential economic benefit to the city. Lottery ensures that all dedicated applicants who have invested time and resources into preparing their businesses have an equitable chance to contribute to the communities economic future.

Dana also handed out a City of Carver regulation that made an exemption for their central business corridor for cannabis retail locations.

Planning Commission discussion:

Harvala: he does not see a difference between a cannabis dispensary and a bar. He understands it would be an issue if located in the middle of a neighborhood, but not for a main business area. The city is making it hard to start a new business. Issue two licenses; competition is good.

Keller asked if consumption would take place on site. Dana stated that there would not be any consumption on site. Dana did state that some cities have zonings regarding site, sound, smell that is intrusive. Zoning regulations would address that issue.

Ebert asked if parking is a concern. Dana stated that their customers would be in the shop for 10-15 minutes and they would be willing to park 1-2 blocks away.

Ebert asked if there would be security guards. Dana stated there are no security guards, but security is highly regulated by the state. The final regulations have not been finalized.

Ebert requested to know how close 4110 Main Street is to the school and Boniface Field. It was explained that with the exemption requested it would not matter what the number is for the setback.

Motion made by Harvala and seconded by Keller to make a buffer exemption into the downtown zone and to issue 2 retail registrations and use a lottery if more than 2 applicants. Aye 3/0.

REPORTS

- a) Boniface Field – Arborvitaes – Council direction to the Cordell’s to trim arborvitaes at 8645 Wildwood Avenue, was to complete by April 29, 2025.
Cordell stated that he did not see the need for trimming the arborvitaes and to inform Public Works that they could do the work. Assistant Clerk advised Cordell that homeowners may not be notified before the work is done.
- b) Lion’s Scoreboards
Lions have given permission, per Linda Froehling’s email, to discard two scoreboards - located at Boniface Field and Townsedge Field.

MISSILE PARK PLAYGROUND

- a) Council direction given to Parks Commission to develop design for playground equipment area in the existing area (quotes not requested at this time)
 - Federal Prevailing wage rates apply
 - Playground Companies
 - Grant Application – budget estimates and breakdown of proposed project

Motion made by Harvala and seconded by Keller to table item and to meet at Missile Park on August 12th to review the playground area. Aye 3/0

Noted that Council at their next meeting will be scheduling the Public Hearing regarding Cannabis for August 20th.

Harvala volunteered to represent the Economic Development Commission and report at the August 6th Council Meeting.

NEW BUSINESS

Commission was requested to review the No Parking request on Glacier Road made by resident Jason Zattler

No one on the commission thought No Parking should happen on both sides of the street. After discussing possibilities, they suggested that if a No Parking area must be installed it should be only on one side of the road from the corner to where the median is on the northside by Mackenthun's.

Jami White from Kenetic Bud Holdings LLC was present to give a brief statement from their company regarding the application. Their business has operated in multiple states for over 11 years with an impeccable compliance record. There has not ever been an issue with selling to a minor, and this is especially important to them. They maintain a sober workplace and have no consumption on-site policies. Public Safety is invited at anytime to come through their business and review safety and security measures.

Commission discussed the CUP application is a step in the cannabis site review process, and a public hearing also will need to be held. There was not found to be any reason to deny approval of the site plan.

Motion made by Harvala and seconded by Jarocki recommending the council to hold Public Hearing for the CUP application. Aye 2/0

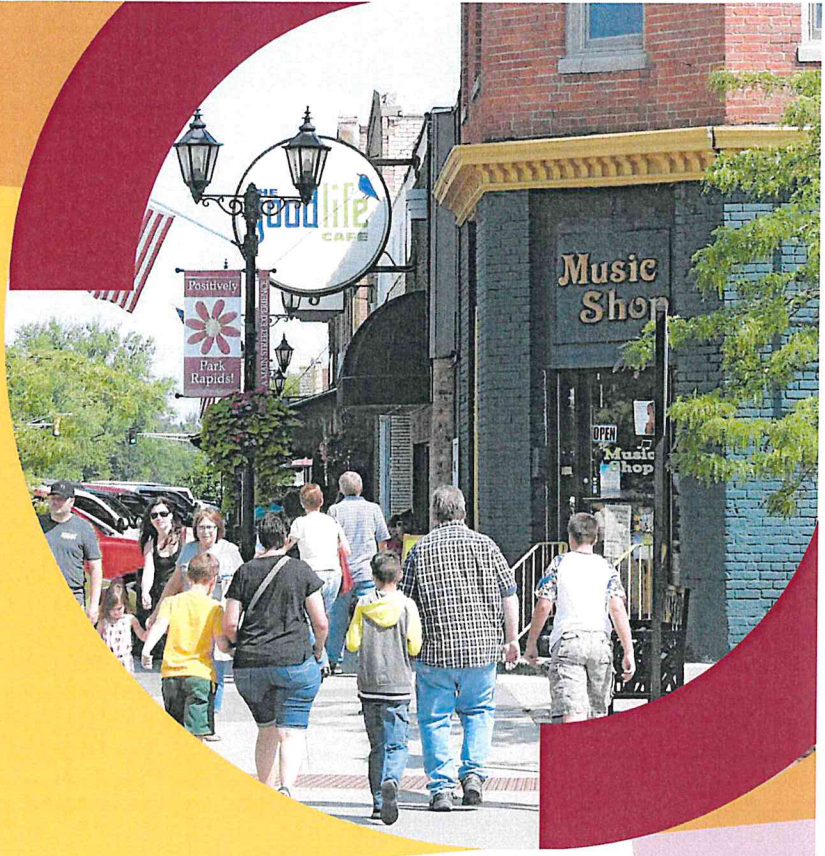

FEBRUARY 4: 12:30-2:30 SESSION 1: COURSE WELCOME AND OVERVIEW OF EXPECTATIONS

Description: Let's get started! This session is a 'welcome to the course' where participants will meet others in the cohort, explore the resources for learning, and create shared expectations.



FEBRUARY 11: 12:30-2:30 SESSION 2: EXPLORING ECONOMIC TRANSFORMATION

Description: Economic transformation is about more than one project or business, and it happens every day. Leaders can make smart investments in cultivating resources and capacity that helps their community to become more equitable and sustainable. This session describes alternative concepts and practices practitioners can use to navigate complex community change.

FEBRUARY 25: 12:30-2:30 SESSION 4: ADAPTIVE LEADERSHIP SKILLS

Description: Adaptive leadership drives economic transformation, helping individuals and organizations adjust and thrive in the face of challenge. This session will focus on developing those adaptive skills and competencies to prepare participants to lead change.

MARCH 4: 12:30-2:30 SESSION 5: SYSTEMS THINKING FOR COMMUNITY CHANGE

Description: Navigating community transformation requires leaders to bring a complex network of people, projects, and organizations together to create a common agenda. This session will focus on strategies
